Dear Majority Leader Reid, Speaker Pelosi, Majority Leader Hoyer, and Chairmen Harkin, Baucus, Dodd, Waxman, Rangel and Miller:

We represent grassroots organizations dedicated to health care for all and individual leaders in Native communities around the country that are dedicated to ensuring access to quality, affordable health care for every person living in the United States. We are writing to you today regarding the Indian Health Care Improvement Act (IHCIA), which has not been reauthorized since 1992, despite the United States' responsibility for the health care of Native people.

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Indian people suffer some of the worst health outcomes of any group in the country. The Indian Health Service is chronically underfunded, inadequately staffed, and out-of-date. Patients must often travel great distances to facilities and wait hours upon hours to be seen. Native people have extremely high rates of uninsurance, and when they do make it into the clinic or hospital they often receive substandard care and biased treatment.

The United States' debt for Native people's health is long past due. Since 1992, the health care system of the United States has evolved. The American health care system benefits from increased emphasis on wellness and prevention and expanded in-home services. Facilities have been modernized. Yet services and facilities for Indian people have not been similarly updated, and this abysmal situation contributes to shocking health disparities. Reauthorization of IHCIA is a necessary step toward bringing health care for Native people into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century and promoting equity in health.

Our country is stronger and healthier when we all get the health care we need. We are very pleased that Congress is poised to take action on Native health this year, with IHCIA reauthorization included in both the House and Senate health care reform bills. Although both versions of IHCIA reauthorization would represent an improvement over the current situation, the House version goes much further to advance the changes needed to fulfill the United States' obligations to Native people. The undersigned organizations and leaders urge you to ensure that the final health care reform bill include the House version as the foundation for IHCIA reauthorization, with additional Senate provisions as outlined in the attached charts prepared by the National Indian Health Board.

Furthermore, we are pleased that Congress is moving toward increasing funding for community clinics. It is extremely important that urban Indian health organizations, the only source of care for many Native people, be eligible for this increased funding. To accomplish this, the final health care reform bill must use the Senate language, which includes FQHCs and not only Community Health Centers. If only CHCs are covered, urban Indian health organizations will be excluded from the support they desperately need.

The United States has waited far too long to meet its health care obligations to Native people. These Native health measures will represent a historic step in the right direction.
